


The year ended with a gallery walk where students showed off their projects to each other and staff




Titrations

Students in the grade 12 Chemistry class performed a classic lab: an acid base titration. Titration is an analytical technique used by chemists to determine concentration, purity, or contents of an unknown sample. In this lab the students titrated Asprin tablets to determine how much active ingredient is actually included. The lab techniques learned included precision measurement, the use of indicators, and sample preparation.




